The teachers of the various departments have identified slow learners in their subjects and have conducted mentoring sessions just after the first internal test based on the marks secured by the students. A list of low performers, average performers and high level performance is prepared and special mentoring sessions are conducted for low performers and average performers suggestions are provided to low performers to enable the students overcome their learning difficulties. The college has also established Placement Cell for providing exposure to the students about the career opportunities. Every year, soft skills programmes and career counselling programmes are organized. Moreover, Students Grievances Redressal Cell has been established and counselling is given to the students. To guide and mentor the students, the college has well qualified and experienced faculty. The college has published an updated prospectus every year and is made available to the public about the programmes offered and the curricular and co-curricular activities. Apart from the prospectus, the college also publishes a magazine Srujana highlighting the achievements of the students/ staff showcasing their talents.
